# 10 "Mad Men" era office staples that don't exist anymore


From the clip of the series: "Hey put that back!" – "I'm going home."

## WHAT WERE THEY THINKING? TEN ADS THAT SPARKED CONTROVERSY

The only thing worse than making people be ashamed of a non-conformist hairstyle is doing so by using an ancient racist stereotype. In print ads for its shaving products, Nivea depicted a clean-shaven African-American man with a short hairstyle holding an African bearded version of his head in his hand. The slogan: "Re-civilize yourself." Many people turned to social media sites to express their displeasure with the implication that people who wear African hairstyles are uncivilized.
