

PETS

It is very important for children to take responsibility for a pet. They can learn to be caring and thoughtful and have to remember to feed the pet and clean out cages and generally look after a living being. Have you thought about something a bit more exotic than a dog or cat? Here are some more unusual ones:

I love cavies for kids for several reasons. Guinea pigs don't typically bite, are not as fragile as the more popular hamster, and are low-maintenance. They live about 5 or 6 years, which is much longer than a hamster will last, and love to be patted and scratched. Some pigs even enjoy running around in a large hamster ball to get exercise.





Don't forget the common rat. They make good pets too.

These rodents are so smart! They have unique personalities and love to play with toys and puzzles. Rats are hardier than hamsters and typically live longer than them too. Rats don't have the reputation for biting like hamsters have either.

Leopard Geckos may appear to be rather ugly however they can be quite cute!

These little lizards don't require a large tank like many reptiles do and are very docile for children to handle. They don't have the tendency to bite, especially when raised from the common 3 or 4 week old hatchling, don't require UVB lighting because

they are nocturnal creatures and don't need fresh fruits and veggies prepared daily. They don't smell and are quiet so no need to worry about squeaky hamster wheels turning in the middle of the night.

Perhaps you'd prefer something cuddly instead. What about a rabbit? There are so many different breeds of rabbits to choose from, but the more common varieties are hardy pets for kids. They aren't usually biters, live longer than hamsters, and are very personable.

You could also have a bearded dragon. Like leopard geckos, beardies are gentle creatures. A little hardier than the geckos, bearded dragons don't bite and are the perfect size for small hands. These lizards love to hang out on a child's shoulder while homework is being completed, and are quiet, don't smell, and live up to 20 years.

Last but not least, how about a potbellied pig?

Pigs can be affectionate, curious, playful, clean and odour-free.

However, there are a few things potential owners should know.

Pigs are complex creatures and require an owner who understands their needs.

Pigs are very intelligent. This is usually a positive trait, and in fact potbellied pigs are quite easy to train, much the same as a dog (i.e. can be house trained, leash trained, and will learn a few tricks). However, their intelligence can make them a bit difficult,

too. They are curious and playful, but also head-strong and sensitive. Without appropriate stimulation, they will become easily bored, and possibly destructive.

Pigs love food and can learn to open the fridge, cupboards, pantry – they can search for food everywhere and can even be aggressive with children who have food. Pigs also "root", or dig/explore with their snouts – and in doing so may overturn items in the house, including wastebaskets and can ruin the garden. They can live to be as old as 20.

Roy has been a vet for over 30 years. He was born on a farm in Ireland and grew up helping to look after the cows, pigs and sheep on the family farm. This inspired him to pursue a career working with animals and after five years at Glasgow University in Scotland, he became a qualified veterinary surgeon. As his mother had always talked so warmly about the outstanding beauty of New Zealand, he decided to follow in her footsteps and visit it whilst working. Consequently, he applied for a job there



and got taken on as a vet. So together with his wife he set off for what should have been a two year vet's work contract, but more than forty years on, he is still there.

He loves his job and even now, at the age of 70, he is still working. The positive aspects of being a vet are many. There is the enjoyment of working outdoors especially when treating farm animals and the fun of meeting unconventional animal owners like the lady who lived in a two-bedroomed house with forty cats! It is certainly not a routine job and plans and arrangements can be disrupted by an emergency call. He says he is lucky to have an understanding wife who accepts this.

He has often found himself in unusual situations, such as up a ladder trying to apply medicine to a giraffe's ears, or carefully getting a blood sample from a cheetah.

Emotional times happen such as when an animal has to be put down. At these times it is necessary to be sensitive to the owner's deep grief. Sometimes strange cases occurred such as when a calf with two heads was born. After attempts to save it, nothing could be done and it had to be put down.

Overall, it is a fulfilling job and there is nothing better than the satisfaction of successful treatment and being able to take away an animal's pain.






