# Internships

#### **■** Benefits of Internships

Any student can benefit in some way from completing an internship:

- apply theoretical knowledge in the real world: students have learned a great deal in a classroom environment, but this knowledge will prove far more valuable if they are able to apply it within a professional setting;
- expand on transferrable skills: from verbal communication to problemsolving and even empathy, a variety of transferrable soft skills can quickly be developed through internship programs;
- develop professional connections: few networking opportunities are as powerful as internships, which introduce students to professionals at all levels and from numerous departments. Mentors can provide valuable feedback for future employment;
- boost CVs: internship programmes are increasingly viewed as an essential CV item for the most competitive sectors;
- refine career goals: during an internship, a student may come to realise that a specific work they once found interesting no longer captures their passion. It helps them shift their approach and aim for a career that really sparks their passion.

A. Emily: My six weeks at Rawbank allowed me to grow personally, but it also helped me to gain new skills in basic accounting and customer relationships – experience that I did not previously have. I also gained a better understanding of the banking industry, made a new network, and gained a few new references for the future. But most importantly, I gained a new sense of professionalism and a clearer view of what it meant to be in the professional world.

B. Diana: I consider myself pretty good at multitasking and I like to stay busy. As an intern, I frequently worked on several tasks at a time, so I always had multiple items on my to-do list. I made lots of mistakes: the good thing about making mistakes though, is they become lessons learned. Mistakes are inevitable, but how you choose to learn from them is what really matters.

C. Liam: Internships and education often went hand in hand school year after school year, and, on average, I was overall happy with the experience. Unfortunately, unpaid internships, though often prestigious, are not always an option for a family who is financially obliged to work for money, as opposed to working for free.

D. Owen: During my internship, I learned how to communicate and build relationships with the people I worked with. I learned how to introduce myself, talk about my interests, knowledge and skills with entrepreneurs and business owners, as well as how to ask questions and gain a better understanding of businesses in the market. Overall, this process helped me develop my professional network and emphasised the importance of creating these connections.
