

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The Author Oscar Wilde

Oscar Wilde (1854-1900) is born in Dublin, Ireland. He is a famous poet, writer and dramatist¹. He studies in Ireland and at Oxford University in England. He travels in Europe and in 1882 he goes to the United States. When he enters the US, he says: "I have nothing to declare, except my genius."

When he leaves, he says: "I have civilised America."

Oscar Wilde lives in the Victorian Age, the age of Queen Victoria; she rules² Great Britain for over sixty years, from 1837 to 1901. Victorians believe that patriotism, marriage³ and going to church are very important. So those years are difficult for people like Oscar Wilde: he has unusual⁴ ideas about religion and life.

In 1884, he marries Constance Lloyd and they have two sons. In 1888, he writes *The Happy Prince and Other Tales*. It is a collection of stories for children that he writes for his sons. The stories in this collection are: 'The Happy Prince', 'The Selfish Giant', 'The Devoted Friend', 'The Remarkable Rocket' and 'The Nightingale and the Rose'. In this book you will find the first four stories.

- 1. dramatist: a person who writes plays.
- 2. rules: has the power over a country.
- **3.** *marriage:* the relationship between a husband and a wife.
- 4. unusual: not common.

Other famous works are: The Picture of Dorian Gray (1891), The Importance of Being Earnest (1895), An Ideal Husband (1895) and A Woman of No Importance (1893).


Wilde spends two years in prison for immoral behaviour⁵. When he leaves prison, he goes to Paris. Now he is alone and without any money. In 1900, he dies, only forty-six years old.

Oscar Wilde is famous for his aphorisms⁶. Here are some of them:

"All art is quite useless7";

"Illusion is the first of all pleasures";

"The true mystery of the world is the visible, not the invisible".



"What a curious thing!" he says. "There isn't a single cloud in the sky, but it's raining. The climate in the north of Europe is really terrible!"


Then a second drop falls.
